Unocal forms partnership with Rebel Oil

Tevese-Journal Unocal 76 has solidified its position as the No. 2 gasoline retailer in South-ern Nevada by forming a long-term partnership with Rebel Oil Co. Inc. of Las Vegas. Under Tuesday's agreement, nine Rebel Oil outlets in Las Vegas will be re-branded under the Unocal name. and five new Unocal facilities will be built. Rebel Oil convenience stores will still operate under the Rebel name. Details of the agreement were not disclosed.

Rebel Oil operates 15 stations in Las egas and one in Henderson, Unocal

Rebel Oil operates 15 stations in Las Vegas and one in Henderson. Uncoal has six stations, including a Protech Auto Serrice Center, and a truck step in Las Vegas. Atlantic Richfield Co. remains the No. 1 gasoline retailer in Southern Ne-vada, with a 40 percent market share. Lawrence M. Higby, president of Uncoal's 76 Products Co., said that teaming with a well-known and re-spected company such as Rebel rein-forces Uncoal's commitment to the community.

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Tribe leader open to land swap offer

Marinez Associated Press ALBANY, N.Y. — A top leader of the Oneida Indian Nation said Tuesday that land claim negotiations with the Pataki administration could include a deal involving the expansion of Indian concidar expresentative Ray Halbrit-ter, speaking at a public hearing on casino gambing in New York, would not rule out dropping or reducing land claims in exchange for the opportunity to open casinos off Indian reservation land.

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
